APRIL 8

CANDIDATE APPLICATION DUE

Today is the final day to file to run on the City Clerk's website: <http://tiny.cc/CandidateApplications>

APRIL 11

SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS DUE

Documents proving your eligibility to be a candidate for your NC are due today via the Candidate Portal.

APRIL 25

STATEMENT & HEADSHOT DUE

Today is the last day to finalize your photo + personal statement for the City Clerk's candidate webpage.

APRIL 23

MAIL BALLOT REQUESTS OPEN

Vote-By-Mail ballots are available by request via the City Clerk's website: <http://tiny.cc/NCvoters>

JUNE 3

MAIL BALLOT REQUESTS CLOSE

Voters must request Vote-By-Mail ballots by this date, or else vote in person at the Election Day polls.

JUNE 22

ELECTION DAY

- Voting available today at in-person polls
- Vote-By-Mail ballots must be postmarked by this date or dropped off at today's polling place

glossary

**NC**

Neighborhood Council

**BOARD**

Refers to a Neighborhood Council or to the elected members of an NC, who form its governing board

**BOARD MEMBER**

Neighborhood Council member

**DONE / EMPOWERLA**

The City of Los Angeles Department of Neighborhood Empowerment, primary support agency for LA's Neighborhood Council system. EmpowerLA oversees NC elections outreach.

**CITY CLERK**

The LA City Clerk's Elections Division oversees NC elections admin.

**STAKEHOLDER**

Someone who is served by an NC. This includes all who live, work, study, worship, or own property or a business within NC boundaries, as well as community interest stakeholders belonging to locally based service organizations meeting **criteria in the City Charter**.

about NCs

LA's **99 Neighborhood Councils** (NCs) are the grassroots arm of the Los Angeles City government. Members are elected by their communities and serve their terms of office as volunteers.

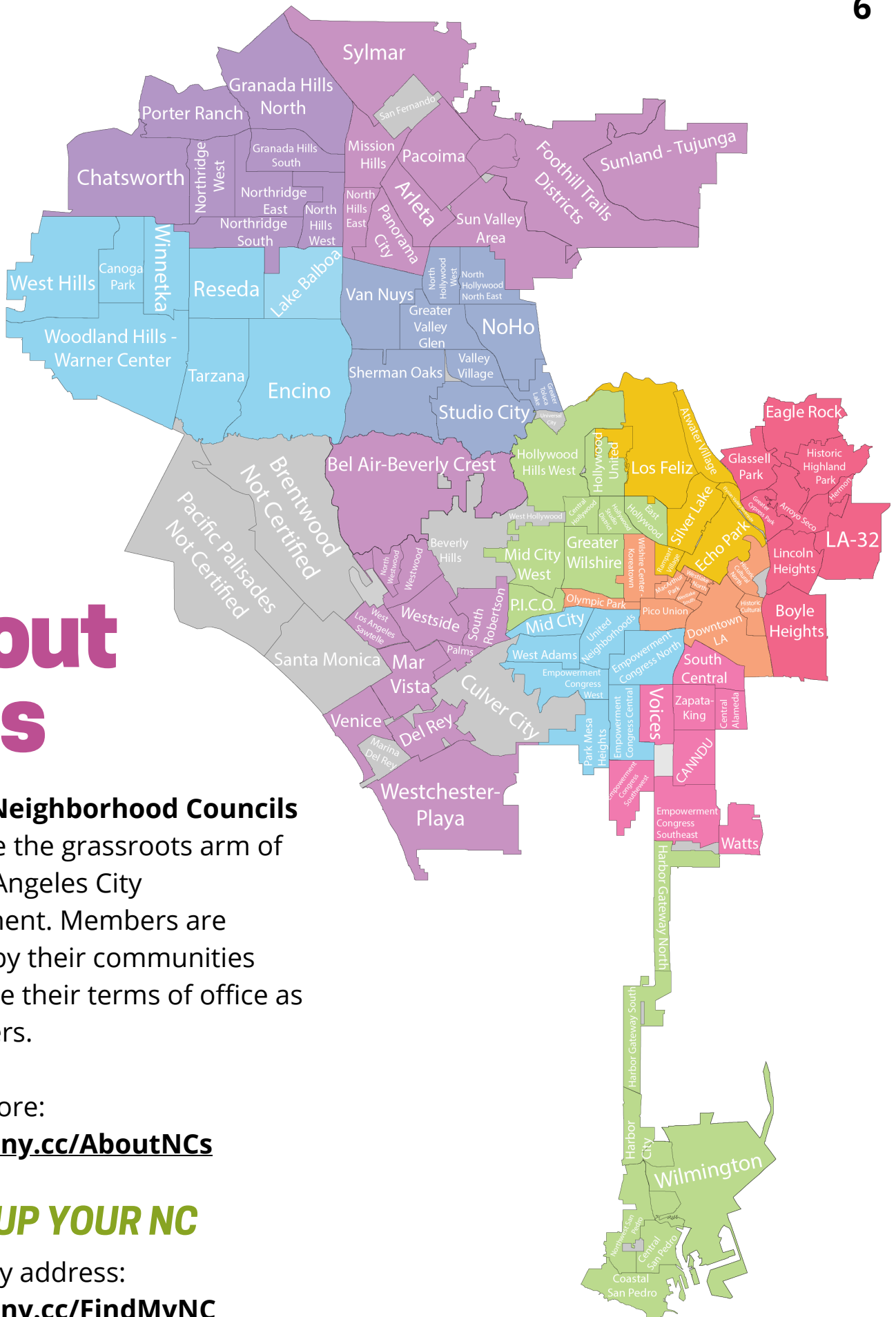

what do NC members do?

Neighborhood Council members are elected by the communities they serve, and serve their terms as volunteers. Most serve 2 year terms; a few serve 4 year terms, due to differences in NC bylaws. All newly elected NC members take office on **July 1** following an NC election cycle.

NCs are advisory to City decisionmakers, such as the LA City Council and City commissions, so they can profoundly impact how the City responds to key local issues or provides services in their community.

As members of a body that is part of City government, NC members must take the trainings required of other California public servants.

Who can run?

Anyone who lives, works, studies, worships, or owns property or a business within NC boundaries may run or vote in this election. Community interest stakeholders belonging to locally based service organizations meeting **specific requirements** are also eligible.

Participation is open to those who are not US citizens or legal residents, and also to the unhoused or formerly incarcerated.

Candidates must be 18+ on Election Day except for Youth Seat candidates, who must be 14 - 17. Voters must be 16+ except Youth Seat voters, who must be 14 - 17.

assets to have

Live info sessions include detailed discussion on how to create + use these items:



CANDIDATE STATEMENT

- Goes on City Clerk's candidate webpage + posted at polls
- 1000 character limit = 1/2 page (about 170 words)



HEADSHOT PHOTO

- Goes on City Clerk's candidate webpage + posted at polls
- 2x3 aspect ratio
- Use a current image so you are recognizable



MISSION STATEMENT

- Your elevator pitch as a candidate
- Aim for 100 characters or less (17-18 words)
- Use it online, in print, and in person



CANDIDATE EMAIL ADDRESS

- Set up a dedicated email address for your campaign
- After you're elected, this email becomes your public address



CAMPAIGN LINK

- Website, Google Doc, or other online, publicly accessible landing place where voters can learn more about you + the election

outreach checklist

Whether you're creating flyers, posting on social media, or speaking with voters, your message should always include:

- **Your name**
- **Contact info / website / social media handles**
- **NC + seat you are running for**
- **Mission statement**
- **How / when to vote in your NC election**

Tips on how to make voter outreach part of your daily routine and for sharing your message on print and digital channels are shared during the live Candidate Info Sessions.

talking points

Your talking points form your candidate platform. How you discuss them establishes your reputation as a leader.

BE PREPARED ON THE ISSUES

Know the issues you are passionate about in depth, but be ready to talk to voters about the issues they care most about, such as:

- **Homelessness**
- **Housing / Land Use / Local Development**
- **Parks / Green Space / Recreation**
- **Sustainability / Climate Change**
- **Events / Cultural Affairs**
- **Public Safety / Emergency Preparedness**
- **Business / Economic Development**
- **Transportation**

MAKE PROMISES YOU CAN KEEP

Keeping promises is the key to credibility as a leader, so choosing your words carefully helps shape goals you can actually deliver on.
